Introduction

Summary

Most schools (28%) allocate 15-20 minutes to reading for pleasure in school every day and only 12% for more than 25 minutes. Over half of respondents (53%) say they do not encourage reading for pleasure in the school day as there is not enough time.


The overwhelming majority of respondents (90%) use Accelerated Reader in their school as a supporting reading initiative.


Over two thirds of schools (69%) undertake whole class reading or whole class guided reading.


To grab the attention of the general reluctant reader schools mostly suggest:

Key findings

Reading for pleasure

The majority of schools responding to our survey give 15-20 minutes to reading for pleasure in school every day. 53% of those report that they do not encourage reading for pleasure in school time due to there not being enough time. This finding suggests that more could be done during class time to generate a love of reading.






Reading initiatives

Over 90% of respondents to our survey use Accelerated Reader at their school. A further 69% also do whole class reading, or whole class guided reading. Less than half run Tutor Time Reading. Other reading initiatives include book clubs, reading buddies and paired reading.

Do you use Accelerated Reader in your school?




Do you do whole class reading, or whole class guided reading in your school?

Top 3 'other' initiatives:




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
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
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
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





Other intelligence

The overwhelming majority of Headteachers, subject leaders, literacy coordinators, teachers and librarians who responded to our survey learn about new children's books releases from social media. In a separate question on the use of social media, 39% of respondents say they use Facebook and Twitter and 27% Facebook only. However, book shops and colleagues remain very powerful sources too.

Charlotte Colgan is Assistant
Headteacher – Years 1 and 2 at Lyon
Park Primary School, part of the
Wembley Schools Federation, in west
London. She joined the four-form
entry school in September 2018 and
leads on reading across all year
groups spanning over 900 children.

In January 2019, Lyon Park was given an Ofsted requires improvement rating, highlighting that "pupils in all year groups are not making good enough progress in reading and writing" and that "not enough teaching is of good quality, particularly in reading and writing in key stages 1 and 2". Inspectors also directed the school towards "ensuring that pupils have access to high-quality books that motivate

> them to read and stretch their comprehension skills".

The visit came too early for the sustained impact and outcomes of "a range of new initiatives to improve the quality of teaching and learning" introduced by Charlotte and the new senior leadership team to be seen at that time. Two years on, however, and the school is on an upward trajectory with a new Reading Policy outlining a commitment to tailoring a

curriculum to enhance
the learning opportunities and
engagement in reading for all
children. The relationship with
Laburnum House Educational, which
Charlotte also engaged in her role as
English lead at her former school, has
been a critical enabler of this new
approach at Lyon Park.

"When I arrived at Lyon Park we had one library that was not well stocked in any way and this was flagged by Ofsted," she explained. "Now we have two fully functioning libraries, which came about through my work with the school council. They helped to design and stock them as they sent out multiple surveys including book lists to gather pupil voice. This was important to supporting my aim to bring Accelerated Reader to the school. Creating a love of reading through Accelerated Reader has been a big focus and Laburnum House Educational, has helped that by supplying enough books to roll this out successfully."

With Accelerated Reader, a pupil takes a computer-adaptive baseline assessment in STAR Reading, chooses their own appropriately levelled book from the library, and can complete a comprehension quiz when they have finished reading which they receive feedback on.

"Accelerated Reader combines that ability to give freedom of choice to the child with ensuring they are reading a book that is appropriate to them rather than just any banded book," Charlotte said. "They are

getting books they want to read, and therefore they pick them up more. The assessment is brilliant too – half-termly STAR tests and comprehension quizzes, so they are thinking about what they are reading and remembering it, and this is especially important leading to Year 2 and Year 6 SATs. It has generated a genuine passion for reading, and our 100% club brings further motivation for the children."
