The Social Media Story

Introduce the idea of giving things up. Ask:

What do people give up for Veganuary? (meat - it's vegan + January)

What do they stop doing in Stoptober? (smoking - it's Stop + October)

What about scroll-free September? (social media)

Students guess the first two and turn to page 2 to check the third answer.

Survey: Using your phone

In pairs, students design a survey about phone use. They include three questions. Students interview everyone in the class. They get back into their pairs, collate their answers and produce their stats.

Sample questions

1 What time do you turn your phone off in the evening? 2 What is your favourite social media platform?

3 Have you ever given up your phone for a period of time?

Example stats

1 Seventy percent of the class never turn off their phones. One person turns their phone off at 6pm and three people turn their phones off between 8.30 and 10pm.

2 Eighty percent of the class like Snapchat best; 20 percent like Insta.

3 One person has given up their phone once, for a week.

Background information

This season was a breakout season for Raheem Sterling. He has become one of the most successful of the current generation of English players.

Lead-in

In pairs, students think of three good things about football and three bad things. Share ideas across the class. Examples: **good things** — great entertainment, playing FIFA, being a fan; **bad things** — too much money in the game, fan violence, fan racism.

Reading: Comprehension

Find this information.

- the number of goals that Raheem Sterling scored last season
- what Raheem did when four Chelsea fans shouted racist abuse at him
- what the referee did when monkey chants were heard in Cagliari stadium
- why England were playing Montenegro in March 2019
- who knocked Manchester United out of the Champions League last season
- 6 how English players responded to Twitter abuse of Ashley Young
- the two punishments that Raheem would like to see for clubs for racist behaviour from their fans

Background information

Last year, not many people had heard of pop star Billie Eilish. This year she's everywhere, although she's only 17.

Lead-in

Play students a few lines of one of Billie's songs. Choose something suitable – such as *Bellyache*. Ask students to identify the artist and the song.

Students then look at the picture of Billie Eilish on the cover of this magazine. In pairs, they think of an adjective to describe her. Share ideas across the class. Examples: tough / moody / sulky / serious / glum / pouty. Use the cover question.

Comprehension: Reading

Lead-in

NEW! Being Seventeen

Background information

This new feature finds out how 17-year-old teenagers live in different parts of the world in 2019. We start off in Texas, meeting Patrick Slafko.

Lead-in

Give students these questions. They note down answers that are true for them.

- What's the biggest thing in your life?
- **2** What's the biggest worry in your life?
- If a teen visitor from abroad came to visit, where would you take them?
- What is the climate like where you live?
- **5** What is your view on guns?

Reading: Comprehension

Read through Patrick's answers with the class. Invite students to compare their own answers with Patrick's.

Examples:

The biggest thing in Patrick's life is music. Music is the biggest thing in my life too.

Patrick would take a visiting teen to Freddy's. I'd take a visiting teen to a basketball game at our town stadium.

Speaking: Interview

Students use the questions on page 11 to interview each other, using the answers they prepared above.

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Find out the latest news about Greta's campaign to stop the climate crisis on Instagram: @gretathunberg.

Lead-in

Ask: Have you heard of Greta Thunberg? What do you know about her? Share ideas across the class.

Reading: Comprehension

Do this activity before students look at the article about Greta. Make a photocopy of page 13 and cut out the paragraph headings. Make enough copies of the new version for one per pair. Stick the headings in random order on a separate sheet of paper. Make enough copies for one per pair. In pairs, students match the headings to the paragraphs. They turn to the article to check their answers.

Speaking: Nobel Prize

Students work in small groups. They imagine they are the Nobel Committee for awarding the Peace Prize. They think of three people alive or dead to whom they would like to award the Nobel Peace Prize and why. Groups present their three nominations to the class, explaining why their nominees should win the prize. Write all the names suggested on the board. Everyone in the class votes for one name on the board, writing their vote secretly on a small slip of paper. Collect in the votes.

For the next lesson or at the end of this lesson, count the votes and prepare an award card for the winner. Put the card in an envelope. Announce the third and second place runners up. Then hand the winning card to a student in the class. They make the announcement: *The winner of the Class Nobel Peace Prize for 2019 is ...*

Background information

Halloween is an ancient festival that was taken to the United States by Irish immigrants in the mid-1800s.

Reading: Comprehension

- When was the first Day of the Dead parade held in Mexico City?
- According to Mexican culture, whose souls return to Earth on the 31st of October?
- What do trick-or-treaters collect from friends and neighbours in the U.S.?
- What might happen to your phone in the Hoia Baciu forest in Transylvania?
- Can you just turn up in costume and join in the Kawasaki Halloween parade?
- Which city is a good place to party at Halloween in the UK?

[Answers: 1. Four years ago. 2. The souls of dead children. 3. Coins and candy. 4. It might malfunction. 5. No! You have to book months in advance. 6. Manchester.]

Speaking: Where am I?

Students work in pairs. Give them a few minutes to think of a quote from a person at one of the five events in the article. The quote doesn't mention which event they are at. Examples:

1 "I'm way to scared to knock on the door of that house."

2 "Isn't this near Dracula's castle?"

3 "This event is great, and it's all thanks to James Bond!"

Reading: Comprehension
